Speaker Profiles

Dr Clarissa Giebel (@ClarissaGiebel)

Clarissa Giebel is a dementia care and ageing researcher at the University of Liverpool and the NIHR ARC NWC. Her main research focuses on enabling people with dementia staying independent in their home for as long as possible, whilst addressing health inequalities that might act as barriers.

Dr Lena O'Connell (@lena_oconnell)

Lena completed her PhD at the University of Liverpool this year, focusing on technology in dementia care. Her research interests lie within the intersection of dementia care, volunteerism, and technology supported care delivery. As an Impact Reporting Manager at tide (Together in Dementia Everyday), she measures the service's social impact on family carers, people living with dementia and the health and social care system.

Dr Craig Murray

Craig is a Lecturer in Orthoptics at the University of Liverpool and the Director of Studies of the Undergraduate degree in Orthoptics. His research is looking at how eye movement is linked to the detection of neuro-degenerative diseases.
